

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD CHAIRMAN

In 1868, the founder of LFCS, Rev. Johann Buenger, made a choice that would save, sustain and fundamentally change the lives of children and families for generations. He acted during a time of great need and uncertainty in our nation's history. The Civil War left countless families broken and children destitute. Rev. Buenger recognized the need and called members of his congregation and community to help. It was for times such as these that the community came forward to help fulfill his mission of care.

Today, that mission continues in another tumultuous time in history. The pandemic and resulting social challenges have greatly impacted children of all ages and their families. The landscape for the need of social services has changed. And, just like when the children in Rev. Buenger's community were struggling, it is during times such as these that LFCS answers the call to help.

As we look across this new landscape, this is what we observe related to the children and families we served in 2021. The needs in the community have increased exponentially with the onset of COVID-19. Our adult clients who were already struggling are being asked to face larger obstacles, with increased concerns about unstable housing, employment, income, childcare, and access to basic human needs.

Many of the children we serve experienced extreme stress and trauma, leading to increased symptoms of mental health issues. Due to decreased in-classroom learning, many kids had less opportunity to learn social skills and experienced struggles with academic success. Less time in the classroom also meant less time in front of mandated reporters of child abuse and neglect.

Reverend Buenger saw the need, answered the call and mobilized resources to do good work on behalf of children and families in Missouri. Today is no different. Each of us are in a position to ease the burden of those in need. The demand for hope, help, and healing continues to increase but we cannot do our work without you.

Thank you to our corporate partners and the many foundations and local businesses that support the agency. Thank you to our donors, partner organizations, and state and government leaders who support our mission. We are grateful for the caring support of the many individuals who generously give of their time, talent and treasure in order to empower children and families to overcome obstacles today so they can build a better tomorrow.

Caring for Children

Serving children has been and always will be at the heart of the LFCS mission.

In 2021 a total of 6,308 children's lives were saved, sustained and fundamentally altered as a result of our work.

On October 19, 2021, The American Academy of Pediatrics, American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatric and Children's Hospital Association declared a national emergency in child and adolescent mental health.





LFCS responded to the need. We provided 26,315 sessions of professional mental health counseling and psychiatric care to over 2,400 children. Services were provided in more than 60 schools and community locations, including underserved neighborhoods, ensuring access to care.

An increase in the severity of mental health symptoms in the children we served resulted in an increase in the average number of sessions from 9 to 16.





Prevention education for at-risk youth helped 1,235 children, grades 3-8, learn essential social skills like proper communication, conflict resolution and anger management in group settings. One-on-one follow up sessions also offered students additional support.

In 2021, there were over 13,000 children in foster care in the state of Missouri. These children have been placed in state care due to abuse and neglect and are suffering from trauma, uncertainty, confusion and fear.





LFCS responded to the need. We provided 145 children with a safe, stable home through foster care case management. Our dedicated case managers worked with kids in care along with their parents and foster parents to make sure that each child was safe and received the care they deserve.

Keeping kids safe remained a top priority in 2021. By helping parents be the best they can be through parenting support services, more than 1,000 children are free from the risk of abuse and neglect.






Adoption and foster care case management provided permanent, safe and loving homes for 88 children.

Hilltop Child and Family Development Center provided early childhood education, professional counseling, health screenings, parenting support services and care to 127 children aged 0-5 years and their families. Follow-up services including mental health counseling, working with school personnel to ensure academic success and case management services were provided to 23 students who graduated from Hilltop. But LFCS did not stop there in answering the call for need.





Strengthening Families

According to the International Federation for Family Development (IFFD), strong families lead to strong communities. In addition, members of stable families have a higher life expectancy and a lower risk of mental illness, alcoholism, domestic violence and involvement in criminal activity.

LFCS strengthens families through services including mental health counseling, adoption, pregnancy support, and foster care. We work to identify risk factors most commonly associated with abuse and neglect in an effort to end the cycle for good.

LFCS responded to the need. Over 500 individual family members of children enrolled at Hilltop also received case management services, professional mental health services and in-home visitation to ensure that the entire family unit was healthy, safe and stable.





Risk factors for abuse and neglect, identified through individual client assessments, include lack of parenting education, mental health concerns, and unsafe and unstable living situations. Parenting education and support services provided 18,268 hours of service to parents facing challenges with the education and skills needed to cope with those challenges and ensure the safety of their children.

Respite care provides temporary care for children of parents needing time to make necessary adjustments in order to better care for themselves and their children. A total of 195 days of care were provided for 24 children.





Facing an unplanned pregnancy can be scary and filled with uncertainty. Over 300 women were guided through this difficult time with professional care and understanding in order to make the best decisions for themselves and their unborn child.

LFCS answered the call for mental health services, providing more than 530 adults with 6,361 sessions of professional therapy. Clients are taught to develop coping skills to navigate through life's difficult challenges, and in 2021 their symptoms decreased by 80%.





LFCS Adoption services provided comprehensive support to over 100 families hoping to adopt. Adoption services include home assessment, education, identifying match possibilities with LFCS birth parents, planning for placement and support throughout the process and beyond.





Financial Overview For Fiscal Year ending December 31, 2021


2021 Revenues
